In addition to the symposium on Saturday, June 24 from 9:30 am-3:30 pm at the festival grounds, the BAMS Fest will also host a series of workshops on "the Art of Mass Gatherings approach" during its inaugural BAMS CONX conference at the Berklee School of Music on Thursday, June 22. The symposium and workshops provide a unique opportunity for attendees to engage in hands-on learning, exchange ideas, and share best practices in emergency preparedness, safety, sustainability, accessibility, and community engagement.

"People who set up festivals are skilled at creating temporary cities with all of the necessary infrastructure such as water, waste, power, and structures," explains Matthew Ché Kowal, co-founder of Majestic Collaborations along with Molly North. We'll use the BAMS Festival as a hands-on classroom for learning how to enhance the safety, safety, accessibility, sustainability, and community engagement of events. Local experts will lead a variety of interactive site tours and hands-on workshops, and participants are invited to share their own experience and expertise throughout the day.

Lunch and morning coffee are included.

Several sensory and physical accessibility accommodations are available by advance request. This event does involve significant amounts of time outdoors including moving around the site. A covered tent with chairs and water refill station are available throughout the day. There is a wheelchair-accessible portable restroom on the festival grounds. The festival itself begins at noon, so for about half of the day you may be nearby large crowds, with a lot of sensory stimuli including amplified music, smells, and stage lights.

About the program

The Art of Mass Gatherings is an initiative of Majestic Collaborations that uses festivals as classrooms to activate an arts-focused approach to resilience and emergency preparedness. Local event producers are invited to attend a series of talks and workshops where local luminaries and special guest experts will present on how all gatherings can be elevated by adopting the four lenses of safety, accessibility, sustainability, and community engagement in their planning. Site tours and training will highlight some of the successful measures in place at BAMS to increase broad community engagement, accommodations, safety, and reduce the festival's ecological footprint.
